Virtual energy assessments give insights toward savings

ver wonder where your energy dollars are going? With Inter-County Energy's virtual energy assessment online application, you can analyze your home's energy use and find ways to save.

We want to encourage you to take this assessment yourself. Once you know where your energy dollars are going, you can take steps to make sure your home heating and cooling are as energy efficient as possible.

The free virtual energy assessment tool allows you to view energy usage and costs by using your billing history, actual temperature information and some information about your home. Once you enter your account ID number, as it appears on your bill, you will begin the analysis.

The virtual energy assessment is free, available at any time and only takes about 10 minutes to complete. By answering some simple questions about your home's square footage, age, number of occupants and a few other variables (including types of appliances, windows and televisions), you will find out where your energy dollars are being spent. There's also a section to help explain why your energy costs may be different from last month or last year.





The best part of the online assessment is you can learn about ways to save energy and money by making a few no-cost to low-cost changes to the home. Some of these changes are really simple, and the savings can add up over time. Plus your home will work more efficiently as we enter the time of year when a long cold snap can really drive up your monthly energy costs.

Your home's profile will be saved for whenever you want to return and

make adjustments or review recommendations for energy savings. It's a simple process, and we hope you'll find the investment of your time worth it.

ELECTRICAL OVERLOADS

UNLOADING THE CIRCUIT

Overloaded circuits can cause fires and death. Make sure your home's electrical system is up to snuff.

To prevent problems:

- Never plug more than two appliances into an outlet at any one time. Don't piggyback extra appliances on extension cords or wall outlets. Use only outlets designed to handle multiple plugs.
- Know the amount of power you're placing on an outlet or circuit. Some recommend that each outlet or circuit should not exceed 1,500 watts.
- Major appliances should be plugged directly into their own wall outlet since they are heavy power users.
